

1. Gokayama Area

This excursion introduces the natural and cultural highlights of the Shogawa River basin, including the World Heritage site of Gokayama. The clear, abundant water flowing from the mountains has supported local life for centuries. It also enabled the transport of high-quality timber downstream, contributing to the development of woodcraft traditions such as Inami carving. Eventually, these waters flow into Toyama Bay, shaping a unique culture and landscape across the region. On this tour, you will experience the rich connection between nature and culture created by this water system.

Fee:	JPY 21,000 per person

Gokayama, a UNESCO World Heritage Site

Gokayama is a UNESCO World Heritage village in the mountains of Nanto City, Toyama, known for its traditional gassho-style houses. It is a “living village” where people still reside today. The area was once covered with mulberry fields for sericulture, but after the war, water was drawn from across the Shogawa River to develop rice paddies. Thanks to its riverside location, the area has abundant water resources that continue to support both daily life and agriculture.

You will enjoy a performance of “Kokiriko,” one of Japan’s oldest folk songs, preserved in Gokayama. Please take in the dance performed to the rhythm of traditional instruments known as *sasara* and *kokiriko*.

Inami Wood Carving Composite Hall

The Inami Woodcarving General Hall, designed by architect Peter Salter, is a facility where the building itself feels like a work of art. Inside, you can see over 200 pieces, including ranma transoms—decorative wooden panels placed above doors or between rooms—and lion-head carvings. Inami developed its woodcarving tradition thanks to the abundant water of the Shogawa River, which allowed a steady supply of high-quality timber to be transported from upstream, supporting the creation of detailed and large-scale works.
